## *We are Neighbors Helping Neighbors*

With the arrival of spring, Solera residents are busy. Friends are leaving for summer destinations, visits, vacations, and trips. That puts us on high watch to keep our eyes and ears open. If you plan to be away for any length of time, be sure to ask a close neighbor to keep an eye on your home and make sure they know how to contact you—just in case. Notify your Block Captain (BC) that you will be gone.

### **Updates**

Door to door solicitation and trespasser reports seem to be down. Continue to let your BC know if you experience problems and report it to the clubhouse front desk. Remember some trespassers walk the neighborhood pretending to be salesmen of utility companies, handymen offering free roof inspections or free carpet cleaning. Others try to conduct anonymous surveys or ask for money and donations for to all sorts of things. Such activities help them find out who lives in the home, what time the house is empty and for how long, what the weekday schedules are (weekends are too unpredictable), cars people drive, whether there is a dog, a hidden key, and so on.

Over the years, Solera has had a very low crime record, but there have always been up and down cycles of crime frequency here. This first quarter of 2025 has been no different. Over the past six months crime has increased throughout Las Vegas. Neighborhood Watch is monitoring statistics. Unfortunately, when someone is up to no good, they can often succeed. It is up to each of us to be vigilant and to do our part to make sure our homes are secure.

We help our Solera community by keeping our eyes and ears open when something does not look right and then reporting it to the police. *We are Neighbors helping Neighbors.*

Block Captains (BC) and residents are urged to report all suspicious activity to the police. If it is a life-threatening crime, or fear of life-threatening, call 911. Otherwise, call 311. Always relay the crime reported to your BC who will report it to coordinators so Solera Neighborhood Watch (SNW) can follow up on it. Do not take crime into your own hands. Just assist the police by reporting promptly.

## Deciphering Police Reports!

What do they mean and why should we pay attention to them. Below is the list of the police reports filed for Solera November 2024-April 2025. Jennifer Hanson shared them with BC's previously.

To help you read the police reports, notice there are several components. Here is what a police report looks like:

What's in the reports? What's not in the reports?

Incident number, date and time are self-explanatory.

The classification gives a number relating to the type of event.

On 4/27, there was an incident classified as "#404 code, Unknown trouble." NW asked the police to explain this and the answer was "a 404- Unknown Trouble is exactly that. There is no info for that call. Meaning someone may have called the police and hung up, or someone called and had no real information to share. But because the call got through to the police, it will still generate an event number."

The complete list of incident code numbers is huge. Below are the more common code numbers we have seen are highlighted. The most common of this short list are

Oftentimes, the same street and address are sighted. We do not seek information on FAMILY DISTURBANCES because they are usually private matters. The ones highlighted are the most frequent, also vague. If no one reports information to us, although we depend on that, we don't snoop!

After seeing a posted police report, NW is often contacted by residents for details. If we have specific, verified info, we share that, but do not tell "I heard that" or "someone told me," unless it comes from the person directly or via the block captain who has spoken to the person.

In looking at the list shared by Jennifer Hanson, a number of them were #404 (unknown) and #417 (family). She also added "solicitors" which shows how frequent this problem has become. On the list are 14 police reports and 8 resident reports.

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3 fights plus another disturbance on the same street  
4 unknown trouble  
2 assault and battery without other details, on different streets  
2 assaults  
1 petty larceny  
1 suspicious vehicle

There were 8 resident solicitor reports. Not all were reported to the police.

We are doing our best to keep you informed and keep Solera safe. Please help us.

If you live on one of these streets and your Block Captain (BC) is not informing you, that's because your street does not have a BC. If you cannot serve as a BC yourself, please help us find one for your street. In the meantime, contact one of the two co-coordinators who will add you to their list so you will stay informed.
